Academic Student Employees (ASE): GSI, Reader, Tutor Physical, Environmental, and Mental (PEM) Demands of the Position

The intent of this "PEM" form is to provide a description of the physical, environmental, and mental demands on an Academic Student Employee (ASE) so that a medical provider can assess the need for a medical leave or accommodation. When the University requires that an ASE be examined by an appropriate University-appointed licensed health care provider for medical leave or accommodation, the University shall pay the costs of this health care provider.

When an ASE requests a medical leave or accommodation, Departments/Units should complete this form and provide it to the ASE. For leave requests, the ASE should give the completed form to their medical provider along with the Certification of Health Care Provider for Employee's Serious Health Condition for the medical provider to sign. For accommodation requests, the ASE should give the completed form to their medical provider with the Work Status Form (which can be found here. Disability Management Services staff can assist students and departments as needed to enact the interactive process for workplace accommodation. ASEs can also bring a union representative (berkeley@uaw2865.org) to interactive process meetings. Workplace accommodations can be appealed to Disability Access & Compliance.

The demands of ASE positions are varied. **GSIs** are engaged in preparation, classroom and laboratory teaching, office consultation, and reading/grading student papers, etc. Additional information about GSI duties can be found in the <u>Policy on Appointments and Mentoring of Graduate Student Instructors</u>. **Readers** render diverse services as course assistants, which normally include the grading of student papers and examinations. Depending on instructor, duties might also include attendance at lectures, office hours, consultation with the instructor and other course-related duties. Readers may not perform teaching duties. **Tutors** are employed to render individual or group instructional activities in support of regular academic programs. Under supervision a tutor's duties might include individual tutoring sessions, group tutoring sessions, presentation at workshops, and other duties as assigned. Tutors do not perform teaching duties assigned to the GSI series.¹
